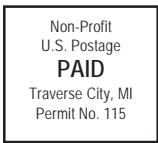
Boy Scouts Receive Tech Skills for Merit Badges

Agriscience Students Participate in Pilot Youth Entrepreneur Project

This past summer, Molly Fish and Carmen Ortiz, TC Central and Chris Steffes, TC West, helped grow garlic, onions, broccoli, Swiss chard, kale, and other vegetables and fruits in 16 garden beds, covering approximately 1,500 square feet, at a community garden located on the grounds

of the closed Traverse City Regional Psychiatric Hospital. They sold this produce at a farmers' market and to a local restaurant, both located on the redeveloping property, known as Grand Traverse Commons. Additionally, they sold the food to low income families who received discount coupons through local human service agencies. This program was sponsored by two nonprofit organizations based in the Grand Traverse area – Little Artshram and the Michigan Land Use Institute in coordination with CTC. These three students are part of a growing trend both here and across the country: Agriculturally-oriented youth programs are cultivating a new generation interested in farming at a time when the average age of farmers is 55. Not only did this pilot program grow local food, it possibly grew new farmers!



Academic Options Abound for CTC Students

Recognizing that the Class of 2011 will be held accountable to the new Michigan Merit Curriculum, CTC has begun to provide academic instruction, aligned to the new academic content expectations, within the technical programs. Placing either highly qualified English Language Arts (ELA) or highly qualified math instructors in selected technical programs, CTC is providing the students with content that meshes these academic standards with the technical curriculum. ELA instruction in various programs is focused on the 12th grade ELA requirements; math instruction in other programs is focused on the math content standards in Geometry, Algebra II, or fulfills the fourth year math requirement. 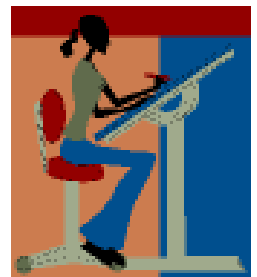
