Get Your "Java Jolt!"

A new coffee shop, **CTC Common Grounds**, is slated to open in mid-March, thanks to the efforts of the second-year Entrepreneurship students in the **Accounting/Office Technology** program. The idea for a CTC coffee shop resulted from a conversation they had, in the fall, with Ms. Julie Gauthier, their Accounting/Office Technology instructor and Mrs. Janie Lesinski, the English teacher working in the program. As second-year students, Sam Healy and Sara DeLong, Benzie Central, Nikita Larson, TCC, and Christina McCann and Beth Cairns, Glen Lake, were well aware that, before any business could be started, a business plan needed to be drafted. Each of them, too, was aware of how a team member's skill set would dictate which business role he/she would assume. During their first-year Entrepreneurship class, each student had written an extensive business plan for a fictitious business; however, writing one for an actual business was another story! Once their business plan was written, edited, re-edited, and finalized, the five then presented their plan, in early February, to four CTC staff members: Dr. Jason Jeffrey, Principal, Ms. Julie Gauthier, Mrs. Janie Lesinski, and Mrs. Mary Smith, Curriculum Supervisor. These four individuals reviewed the students' written plan and oral presentation and determined that the business should get the "green light" and would qualify for a loan. A week later, the students signed their loan agreement and, following that, the students were involved in getting the coffee shop space ready, finalizing the ordering of supplies and equipment, as well as preparing marketing materials. Throughout the process, they all have learned to work as a team and that has been one of the most valuable lessons of this project. When the **CTC Times** goes to print, they hope to have the coffee shop "open for business" – Monday – Friday from 9:00 – 9:35 AM and 10:20 – 10:55 AM. Flavored coffees, hot chocolate, bagels/muffins, fruit, and cookies will be on the menu, and it might even be expanded a bit, depending on the public's response. The staff, students, and public are encouraged to come in and get their "java jolt" and support these young entrepreneurs!



Recently, Michigan's high school graduation requirements have been a hot topic for legislators and the news media. Starting with the class of 2011, students will be required minimally to earn:

- 4 credits in math
- 4 credits in English
- 3 credits in science
- 3 credits in social studies
- 1 credit in physical education
- 1 credit in art
- 2 credits in a language other than English (beginning with the class of 2016)
